From Our Lead Pastor



Dear Friends:

The year was 1990. There was not a week that went by that I did not want to quit the ministry. I felt like the man in the story whose wife was trying to get him out of bed for Sunday morning worship. "I don't want to go to church," he said, "The people are mean, the preaching is lousy and I feel like I'm wasting my time." "But you have to get up," she said, "You're the pastor!"

Later that year I attended a conference led by Eugene Peterson. He was, at the time, pastor of a church in Maryland. I explained to him my frustrations with endless committee meetings, too many expectations and too little time. He said he never went to committee meetings. I asked him how that was possible. He said the church officers handle the committees and he spends his time being pastor to the congregation. I said, "Gee, that's novel. It might even work!"

I thought long and hard about what he said. Imagine a pastor spending all of his or her vocational time as, well, a pastor! I would experience a more gracious ministry. I would have more time with my family. I could watch Monday Night Football!

But I was not Eugene Peterson. Every pastor is unique. What impressed me was that Peterson had his own clear understanding of pastoral ministry and was intentional about doing it.

The next year I began my doctoral work at Fuller Theological Seminary. Peterson was an adjunct professor for spirituality. I studied under him and learned a great deal from him. He came from a pentecostal background. I did not. Nor did his wife, Jan, for that matter. In a private conversation he jokingly referred to me as a "clinker" – the part of coal that does not catch fire.

Eugene was the author of over thirty books including the award-winning "The Message: The Bible in Contemporary Language." He often spoke about joy. "The story of our faith, our very existence, begins and ends with joy," he wrote. I can still picture him breaking into a big, beaming smile. On October 22 of this year he entered the Church Triumphant. He will be greatly missed.

NOTES FROM THE NOVEMBER MEETING OF SESSION

Carl McCune, Clerk of Session

The meeting opened with a joint meeting including the Board of Trustees. Last month the Board Reorganization Task Force report showing how the church could function with the current responsibilities of the Board of Trustees transferring to the Session had been presented. After further discussion, there was consensus to proceed with this reorganization. A proposed change to the Church Bylaws was also discussed and will be voted on by Session in January for presentation to the Congregation at the Annual Meeting in February. Commendation for the work of the Task Force members (Pastor Jeff, Mary Maley, Carl McCune, Jean Parker and Francie Winslow) was expressed.

The Trustees named Mary Maley and Jean Parker to an Ad Hoc Budget Task Force to prepare the 2019 Budget. Later in the meeting, Tom Cole and Loren Rex were named by Session to work along with Pastor Jeff on this Task Force.

The Safety Ministry Steering Committee reported on the successful training session on November 10 and announced that another training will be available in April or May. Efforts will be made to keep the Congregation informed as progress is being made regarding safety and security. A motion prevailed to rename the Steering Committee as the Safety Ministry Team which will be a standing committee of Session.

A motion from the Worship Ministries Team prevailed to have only one Christmas Eve service this year which will be at 7:00 p.m.

A motion prevailed to request Pastor Jeff recruit members for a new Personnel Committee which will be a standing committee of Session.

Membership Update The death of Norma (Mimi) Barker on October 20, 2018 was reported. Current Active Membership is 307.

Presbytery of Lake Michigan A communication was received announcing that the future of Camp Greenwood will be voted on during the December 4 Presbytery meeting. The recommendation will be that the property be sold (potential value of \$3.4 million) with the possibility of the Greenwood Ministries Association buying a portion of the property. The proposal includes 40% of the sale proceeds going to a fund for youth ministries, 30% to a fund to benefit congregations and worshipping communities within the Presbytery and 30% unrestricted.

Building Improvement A motion prevailed to express great appreciation to all the people who have worked on the Building Improvement Committee over the years. They will be honored during the November 18 rededication of the Sanctuary.

The next regular Session meeting will be January 14, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. in room 14.



WHAT EXACTLY IS THE SAFETY MINISTRY TEAM?

and why are some people wearing those weird looking earrings?!

First of all, those "weird looking earrings" are likely to be radio ear pieces to allow for communication around the Church and Parking Lot on Sundays (and special events). People wearing radios include Parking Lot servers, Ushers, and the Sunday Safety Lead. We also have radios in the Balcony, the Church Office and the Nursery to allow communication to/from those locations. Not everyone wearing a radio is an active member of the Safety Ministry Team, but they are active participants in Sunday safety.

The Safety Ministry began after Session officially sanctioned it at their November 2018 meeting. Session agreed that First Presbyterian Church needs a more robust <u>safety</u> program, not just a security program.

A safety program includes the following:

Safety Equipment: first aid kits, fire extinguishers, evacuation tools, alarm systems, security cameras, communication systems

How we respond to medical emergencies

How we respond to fires and electrical outages

How we respond to slips and trips in the parking lot (and throughout the buildings)

and yes, how we respond to security concerns

The purpose of the Safety Ministry Team is to develop and administer a program of safety and security for the congregation, staff and visitors of First Presbyterian Church thus "watching over the people, providing for their worship, nurture, and service". This ministry team of Session will provide programs and capabilities to use before, during and after worship services and other scheduled events, as well as weekday/night operations. The vital work of the Safety Ministry Team will be done while maintaining a friendly and welcoming environment at First Presbyterian Church.

Current members of the Safety Ministry Team are: Belinda Bullard, Bob Bullard, Sue Healy, Jim Hoglen, Mary Lusk, Jenny Moore, Jim Nelson, Mike Scheid, Pat Scheid, Larry Turpin (Chair), Pat Weatherwax. Feel free to reach out to anyone on the team if you have questions or concerns, we are trying to be better prepared but need everyone's help in doing so.
