

Dear Friends:

When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh (Matt 2: 10-11 NRSV).

January 6 is Epiphany. The word Epiphany means "a shining forth" and we associate it with the Star of Bethlehem which led the Magi (the Wise Men) to the infant Jesus. Millions of Christians around the world will set aside that day (Epiphany) to exchange gifts in honor of the birth of Christ.

Perhaps you have heard this humorous but gender-based parody of the Visitation of the Magi:

Question: Do you know what would have happened if it had been Three Wise Women instead of Three Wise Men who came to see the Christ child?

Answer: They would have asked directions, arrived on time, helped deliver the baby, cleaned the stable, made a casserole, and, brought practical gifts!

But the historical account is even more astonishing than the parody if we realize that these people (the Magi) should not have been there in the first place. For these were outsiders with lives that were different and homes that were distant. Herod had not invited them. He spoke to them only after he learned they had arrived. The Romans had not invited them. The religious leaders certainly had not invited them. Not even Mary and Joseph had asked them to come. But God had invited them and God continues to invite others even to this day.

NOTES FROM SESSION

There was no Session meeting in December. However, here is some further information about the Church Board Reorganization which has received approval from the Session and the Board of Trustees in their October and November joint meetings. A proposed change to the Church Bylaws which will accomplish the reorganization will be voted on by Session in January for presentation to the Congregation for a vote at the Annual Meeting in February. The reorganization transfers the current responsibilities of the Board of Trustees into the committee structure of the Session. This is the case with most Presbyterian churches. Four new committees of Session would be created: Finance, Generosity, Personnel and Property. The six current committees of Session (Benevolence, Christian Education, Connection, Ministry Advisory, Safety and Worship) would be somewhat modified with new Purpose Statements. The Nominating Committee remains as a committee of the Congregation.

Here are abbreviated Purpose Statements for the new committees:

Finance - to oversee and manage the operating and capital finances of the church in order to honor Christ by providing sustainable financial resources to enrich, strengthen and support the ministries of the church.

Generosity - to encourage the graces of generosity and faithful stewardship of personal and financial resources and foster a biblically responsible approach to the use of our time, talent and treasure.

Personnel - to assist in employing the administrative staff of the congregation and to enable our church to recruit, retain and motivate staff in a supportive work environment.

Property - to manage the physical property of the congregation for the furtherance of its mission. In doing so, they will oversee the use, maintenance, repair, security and enhancement of all church buildings, land and vehicles.

The rationale for reorganization is that all committees of Session will be more focused on their purpose and that they will have flexibility in deciding the number of times to meet, the size of their membership and the length of service for their members. They will be able to make many decisions on their own and will have direct reporting back to Session at its regular meeting time. Only certain committees will be required to have a member of Session as their chair. Each committee will have responsibility to prioritize the resources they need (money as well as people, talents, & time) and will have responsibility to participate in the budget process which will be led by the Finance Committee.

DEACON'S CORNER

Discussion was made for the new by-laws which will be affecting all of the church members and the make up of the Deacon Board. Progress is being made for the changes.

A huge "Thank You" to Ruth Hetletvedt who will be hand-making birthday cards to be sent out to First Church members by the Deacon Board.

The Christmas Baskets are in good shape financially - food has been obtained and gift cards bought. We will be serving 21 families

The Soup Kitchen had ten volunteers and served 268 people for Thanksgiving

The Food Pantry is still in need of canned fruits and vegetables, spaghetti, Mac and Cheese and canned fruit juices. Thank you for your donations which can be placed in the West entrance food basket.

"Why wear a stick-on nametag?"

10 Compelling Reasons

A new calendar year is a great time to form new habits! After much discussion, thought, and prayer, the Connection Team is inviting you to create a new habit of filling out a stick on name tag each Sunday when you come for worship. Why? I'm so glad you asked! Here are 10 compelling reasons....

- **1.** A nametag reduces psychological distance. The minute you know someone's name, you immediately feel closer and more connected to that person. Simply stated, names reduce the distance between people.
- **2.** A nametag is a conversation advancer and engagement tool. The hardest part about conversations is getting the ball rolling. That's why names are so great. They are THEE basic building block of conversation. The sooner you know people's names, the sooner you feel comfortable around them.
- **3.** A nametag is an invitation for friendliness. It's like walking around saying, "Here. Take it. I'm giving you an opening. I'm making this really, really, easy. All you have to do is say hello."
- **4. A nametag is an equalizer.** When nametags are plain and handwritten, with no last names, logos, titles, acronyms, degrees, positions or designations (just the first name your mama gave you) you successfully level the playing field.
- **5.** A nametag is a disarming gesture. Sigmund Freud discovered that a person's name is the single context of human memory most forgotten. So, wearing a nametag means one less name people have to worry about remembering.
- **6. A nametag triggers positive feelings.** From the time we're born, the name given to us is the word someone uses to gain our attention. When someone says our name with a positive tone and facial expression we feel valued.
- **7.** A nametag personalizes and humanizes someone. Instead of being just another face in the crowd, now I have an identity. A name. I'm a person. Which, in a fast-paced, overpopulated society, is almost an accomplishment.
- **8.** A nametag is a white flag. Human beings avoid conflict, and nametags are natural eliminators of conflict. Think about it: Ever avoided someone because you couldn't remember their name? Remember: Psychological Distance. Disarming people. Building comfort. It works.
- **9.** A nametag is a time machine. The farther you go back in time, the friendlier people become. Spooky, but it makes sense: Decades ago, the world was smaller, slower, simpler and safer. So, of course people were friendlier. Ironically, at this point in our world's history, friendliness is so rare it's become remarkable and magnetic.
- **10.** A nametag INSINUATES instead of IMPOSING. A nametag is non-threatening. It doesn't force anybody to do anything. People can choose to say hi or ignore it. No hard feelings. Either way, it's still an act of friendliness. The nametag is there if you want it.

A few final thoughts – "Wherever you are on your journey with God, **you are welcome here"** - these are the first words that appear when you click on our website's home page. Stick on nametags are a simple & easy way to begin communicating a sense of welcome the moment someone walks through the door. Nametags aren't just stickers, they're statements. Statements about friendliness, about identity, and about our church culture.
