Phil 2:5-11 "The Name of Jesus"

"Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

As a pastor I have considerable amounts of conversation about God. And what I have found to be true in and out of the church is that people are very comfortable with 'God talk' but the moment you shift the conversation to Jesus things can get very awkward. I hear all sorts of talk around being 'spiritual'. People say to me often, "I am a very spiritual person." I have not found one person who professes to be so who has adequately explained to me what he/ she means by that statement. Many tell me they believe in God or a higher power. They can often tell me guite a bit about God. And to be honest, most of what persons like this say jives with scripture. However, there is often enough to determine that the god such persons are referring to isn't the God of scripture. I then usually ask, "What god or what power?" And I frame that question with this question, "The God of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ?" And if the answer is no or no answer at all the conversation usually turns south or ceases all together. Have you truly ever given any considerable thought as to why people are offended by the name of Jesus? Jesus, the one who loved everyone, extended an invitation to all, neglected no one, prayed for forgiveness for the very ones who killed him while hanging on the cross. Jesus, the one who has conquered sin and death by his resurrection. The one who freely gives forgiveness and eternal life to all who put their faith in him. Who could be uncomfortable or even hate such a person? There is something about the name of Jesus that just rubs those who have yet to confess his name wrong. "Who have yet," did you catch that? There is always hope.

So, what is it about this name that offends people? I cannot fathom any good reason. But I can certainly come up with some. How about pride, suspicion, and stubbornness. I pray this is not the case for anyone reading this article. If it is, know that all hope is not lost. Jesus stands ready to receive you. Just come.

Sunday Conversation

The congregation gathered Sunday morning, July 16, following worship service for a conversation with leadership on our future. We discussed goals and projects for the current operational year, which runs from June 2023 – May 2024. The highlights of this conversation are as follows:

Establishment of Ministry Centers: Youth & Families, Young adults, and Seniors The long-term goal would be to sunset our Ministry Team structure. However, in the interim, we would ask the Ministry Teams in their planning process to allow Ministry Centers to determine their work. In other words, what do you want to achieve in the coming year and with who? Allow the answer to this question to drive ministry output. 2023- 2024 Goals

Pastoral

- 1. Pastoral care Contact 80% of FPC membership every 90 days.
- 2. Bible for Lunch: BFL is a bible study program that will be developed and facilitated by Pastor Small and will target our Senior population.
- 3. Midweek Study: Midweek study will approach the study of scripture by engaging current events and issues through the lens of scripture. Will take place in the evening.

Operational

- 1. Hire social media manager/intern
- 2. Improve weekly stream
- 3. Transition Director of Music position to full-time by January 1, 2024

New Initiatives

- 1. Movie Night
- 2. Battle Creek Central High School Football Tailgate: This initiative aims to build relationships with the students and parents of BCCHS by providing an opportunity for fellowship on our blacktop prior to home football games.
- 3. Summer Camp 2024 ("Best Summer Ever" Day Camp, ages 6-14). The hoped-for outcome of the above is 15 new members by end of May 2024.

Capital Projects

The finance team presented a plan to address some needed facility maintenance and improvements that would support the above goals and new initiatives. The plan would result in FPC reducing its reserve fund by \$260,000 to fund these projects. We would also have a mission component that would be launched in September 2023, with a fundraising goal of \$26,000 for local missions. The projects are upgrade elevator, update telephone system, upgrade front sign, repair front entrance doors and railings, resurfacing driveway and resealing parking lot, and gym improvements (floor, lighting and paint).




Kelsey Peterson, our new Social Media Manager/Intern. Kelsey is a rising senior at Pennfield High School. Please welcome her to our First Pres family.

- Hopefully we will adopt and implement a process that will significantly improve how we care for our current congregation.
