Remind Me, Please Luke 24:1-12

I must admit I can forget things quickly, especially on Sunday mornings. My mind is moving a mile a minute and once I get focused on the preaching hour, anything you may have asked me to share with the congregation is lost. So, I have made it a habit of telling

people to "remind me, please" during the service because there is a strong chance that I will forget. Given my situation, I am much more patient with the disciples who could not seem to remember what Jesus had been teaching them for nearly three years about his death and resurrection. Like me, maybe the disciples were so focused on what they wanted to do or what they wanted from Jesus at that moment that they could not hear him on this very important issue.

There is something about being in the heat of the moment that clouds our memory or impedes our listening. Can you imagine the heat of the moment after the turn of events that week? An entry into the city fit for a king, only to land Jesus, their teacher and the one whom they loved, on a cross, to be humiliated for all to see. All their hopes and dreams were crushed in a few short days. How could they remember that he taught them that this must happen and that he would rise in the face of such a tragedy? We certainly want to believe we would have done differently. That we would have been waiting by the tomb in joyful expectation of Jesus rising from the dead. However, I have little confidence that we would have done any different. See, I can't even remember to remind the congregation of a change in the week's schedule even though the clerk asks me to do so right before service begins. I forget every time. So, I am much more patient now with the disciples, unwilling to ridicule them for not remembering.

The hope in this text is that Jesus knew they would forget. So, he made preparations to remind them of all he had taught them regarding his death and resurrection. The women, the angels, and his appearances following his resurrection all serve this purpose. Think about it: every year we remember what took place that faithful week and the 50 days following his resurrection (Eastertide). I think it is more than just a tradition. It is how Jesus Christ reminds us now of what he taught them then. As we continue our celebration of Easter, let us again hear the voices of the angels to the women on that day, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." (Luke 24:5b-7). So, the next time you have to remind someone of something important be patient with them, remembering that your Lord is constantly reminding you of his love.

This meeting started as a combined meeting with the Board of Deacons to welcome our new minister, the Reverend Lorenzo Small and become better acquainted with him. There was an extended time of sharing background information of all those present. Next was a time for questions for Pastor Small and he shared his thoughts with us.

During the separate Session Meeting, Session reiterated our desire to refurbish the Pastor's Office. Pastor Small already has some ideas concerning this and will work with the Property Committee to accomplish the renovation.

Ruth Hetletvedt brought a request from the Discipleship Ministry Team that we designate May 21 as Heritage/Education Sunday. We will honor our 50-year members and our High School graduates then.

Diana Golden of the Property Committee brought a quote from BC Sound for the replacement of our 4 wireless microphones and transmitter which have become illegal to operate under FCC regulations since they are in the 600mhz frequency band. The total cost of the project is \$4,835.02. A motion prevailed to approve the project providing no negative impact is made on our new sound system.

We received a communication from the Retreat Center Committee that, after gathering information about similar venues, they have decided to raise the rental rates. Daily use by church member groups is increasing from \$60 to \$100. Daily use by other organizations is increasing from \$125 to \$200.

Pastor's Report Pastor Small expressed his thankfulness for our start together on this new journey for our congregation. He emphasized his intention to become acquainted with all church members.

The next regular meeting of Session will be at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, May 8, 2023 in Fellowship Hall.




Monday, April 2nd the Deacons passed out 24 Easter Basket/ Boxes that were distributed to 4 Luke 10 families, 1 individual at Kellogg Manor and 19 families chosen by the Family Enrichment Center*. The boxes contained non-perishable food items purchased at the Food Bank of South-Central Michigan, located in Fort Custer. \$40 Meijer gift cards were provided for each family to purchase perishable items, with the 4 largest families getting an extra \$50. The congregation was extremely generous this year in donating Easter candy - each family was able to choose at least 2 packages plus there were several extra, extra large packages that were given to the larger families (8 - 13members). We were also able to share some of the large packages with Charitable Union, S.A.F.E Place and Inasmuch House! (The Inasmuch House director had been wondering how they would fill their Easter baskets when I walked in with our donation of candy - a God thing for sure.)

As always, this is a ministry of many hands - ordering and picking up the food; assembling, packing, labeling and distributing the boxes. Thanks to Deacons Jim Kerner, Joy Miller, Judy Yettaw, Kathy Baker, Steve Case-Blanchard (and William Rasier), Marty Shroll, Tom Coleman and Finley McCrae plus Sharon Dewey from Kinship Care (whose reminder phone calls to families that day were very helpful).

We are often able to learn of some of the challenges these families face (at least two individuals had recent amputations of toes due to diabetes) and felt blessed to be able to offer them a little extra help in the service they provide to their adoptive, foster or personal families. We are so blessed to have such a loving church family. Our "Heart for God in the Heart of the City" gave many the chance to have a Happy Easter dinner.

*The family Enrichment Center is a non-profit organization serving Calhoun County. It exists to fill the gaps in the child welfare system by providing training, support, mentoring and various other services to all families, with an emphasis on adoptive, foster and kinship families (grandparents and other caregivers raising a related child).
